ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

Guiding Questions for Learning at Home:

- What book(s) are you currently reading with your class and/or independently? What are your reading interests?
- Are there any current or unfinished homework, writing assignments/projects you need to complete?
- What online resources are available for me to access at home?

Take advantage of the following learning opportunities daily:

- **Reading:** Read 30 minutes per day and talk about your reading with your family. Parents, spark conversation with these questions like these: Who is the main character? Would you be friends with him or her? Why? What is the major problem in the story? Does it remind you of anything you've experienced? Why?
- **Writing:** Complete any current in-progress or unfinished classroom writing assignments/projects; Keep a journal; Sources for creative writing topics to use at home: [video](#); [NYT article](#); [TED-Ed Blog](#).

SOCIAL STUDIES

As a student of history, you are living through unique times that we will one day read about in a history book.

Ask yourself the following questions as you think about the events you are experiencing:

- How is life changing in America and in the world?
- What are the immediate effects that you are experiencing as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic?
- What do you think will be the long-term effects of the COVID-19 pandemic?
- What are some previous pandemics and what were their immediate and long-term effects?
- Imagine that you have been hired by a publishing company to write a newspaper article about the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. What would you write about? What important facts would you include? Would your perspective be different if you were living in a country other than the United States?



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SCIENCE

Stay connected with your learning by reading and practicing science a couple of times a week.

Science is all around us. Take the opportunity to study the phenomena in your environment. Find a scientific phenomenon you are curious about and investigate by researching articles, videos, or simulations:

- Make a claim: think or write about what you think is happening during the phenomenon
- Provide evidence: during and after you read the article, watch the video, or do the activity, or simulation
- Share your reasoning and connect your evidence with your claim
- Make connections that connect, impact, or relate to your life experiences
